For the foreseeable future we do not need a desal plant to make expensive water that we cannot sell. The AES plant sucks in roughly 17 billion gallons of water a year and is extremely destructive to natural fauna. Additionally as the water comes out of the plant its temperature helps to cause cyanobacterial blooms that lead to Red Tide.	<b>No</b> I would like to examine other alternatives to the "once through" cooling system prior to making a decision on this issue.		<b>Yes</b> AES plant is one of the cleanest power generating stations in California	<b>Yes</b> As with the question above I would like to hear from the supporters of this system to determine if this really makes sense.

The cost to transport it would be uneconomical. So that would leave the city to have to consume it. This would cause the average price for water to escalate and thus be a detriment to our local economy.	<b>No</b> Although that could be one way of lowering the cost of Poseidon's desal water, if it does indeed become cost prohibitive, I still believe this issue can only be determined by the amount of rainfall we receive and how we capture that rainfall for useful means as well as the cost of energy, which fluctuates from day to day. There are too many variables to this issue.		<b>Yes/No</b> It could happen. As with anything, there are thousands of variables.
